Trap Safety for Pet Owners

On a blustery Saturday in October, community members and HSK board members spent the afternoon with Alaska Department of Fish & Game Wildlife Biologist, Nate Svoboda, learning about and getting hands-on experience opening traps and snares.

Trapping is quite common in the Kodiak Archipeligo and there are no restrictions where traps can be set to catch fox, beaver, and other smaller mammals. Occasionally, a dog will find itself in a trap and it's recommended that pet owners be knowledgeable and prepared to release a trap or snare in case their pet is caught. Snares, foothold traps, and body grip traps (for beaver) are commonly used and these were covered in the workshop. After nearly an hour of hands-on experience, participants left feeling more prepared but also more aware that keeping pets under control and in sight while hiking is really important for their safety. We hope to offer this workshop again next fall so watch for future announcements.

Keeping Your Pets Safe During the Holidays





There are many things that could be around the house over the holidays that could pose risks to your pets. According to the American Veterinary Medical Association, here is a list of some things to keep in mind.



- Chocolate is toxic to dogs and cats.
- Artificial sweeteners often found in baked goods, candy and chewing gum, xylitol, has been linked to liver failure and death in dogs.



• **Table scraps** –foods that are healthy for people can be poisonous to pets, including onions, raisins and grapes.



- Water additives for Christmas trees can be hazardous to your pets. Do not add aspirin, sugar, or anything to the water for your tree if you have pets in the house.
- **Ornaments** can cause hazards for pets. Broken ornaments can cause injuries, and ingested ornaments can cause intestinal blockage or even toxicity. Keep any homemade ornaments, particularly those made from salt-dough or other food-based materials, out of reach of pets.



• **Tinsel** and other holiday decorations also can be tempting for pets to eat. Consuming them can cause intestinal blockages, sometimes requiring surgery. Breakable ornaments or decorations can cause injuries.



• **Electric lights** can cause burns or electrocution when a curious pet chews the cords.



• Flowers and festive plants can result in an emergency veterinary visit if your pet gets hold of them. Amaryllis, mistletoe, balsam, pine, cedar, and holly are among the common holiday plants that can be dangerous and even poisonous to pets who decide to eat them. Poinsettias can be troublesome as well. The ASPCA offers lists of plants that are toxic to dogs and cats.



- Candles are attractive to pets as well as people. Never leave a pet alone in an area with a lit candle; it could result in a fire.
- Potpourris should be kept out of reach of inquisitive pets.


